δείγμα *deigma* neut sing acc example

Jude 7, "as Sodom and Gomorrah, and the cities around them in a similar manner to these, having given themselves over to sexual immorality and gone after strange flesh, are set forth as an example, suffering the vengeance of eternal fire." δείγμα deigma neut sing acc example, evidence

Classical Greek: "sample," "pattern," "paradigm," "plan," "proof," "sketch," also "evidence," as in legal evidence or testimony of God's righteous judgments.

- 1. The unbelieving Egyptians (and probably some unbelieving Jews) whose lives were taken by God at the first Passover.
- 2. The angels "who did not keep their proper domain."
- 3. The destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah that were destroyed by fire.

Jude 14, "Now Enoch, the seventh from Adam, prophesied about these men also, saying, 'Behold, the Lord comes with ten thousands of His saints ["holy ones"—i.e., angels],' "

ἀρχή *archē* fem plur dat principalities; ruler, realm, rule; power

έξουσία exousia fem plur dat authority, power; ruling power, root has the idea of one who has the freedom to choose, i.e., the authority

Eph. 3:10, "For the purpose that the multifaceted wisdom of God might be made known now to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly realms" [~RD]

2 Pet. 2:7, "and delivered righteous Lot, who was <u>oppressed</u> by the filthy conduct [licentious, lewd behavior] of the wicked"

pres pass part masc sing acc to oppress, to make distressed or anxious, or anguished

2 Pet. 2:8, "(for that righteous man, dwelling among them, tormented his righteous soul from day to day by seeing and hearing their lawless deeds)—"
