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Running to Win

Philippians 3:12–14



Context

Php. 1:27, “Only let your conduct be worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that whether I come and see you or am absent, I may hear of your affairs, that you stand fast in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel, [NKJV]

Php. 1:28, “and not in any way terrified by your adversaries, which is to them a proof of perdition, but to you of salvation, and that from God.”

In Php. 3 the focus is on standing firm against error.

Two sources:

- 1. The Judaizers: added human works to justification and/or spiritual growth (sanctification).**
- 2. The enemies of the cross of Christ, Php. 3:17ff**

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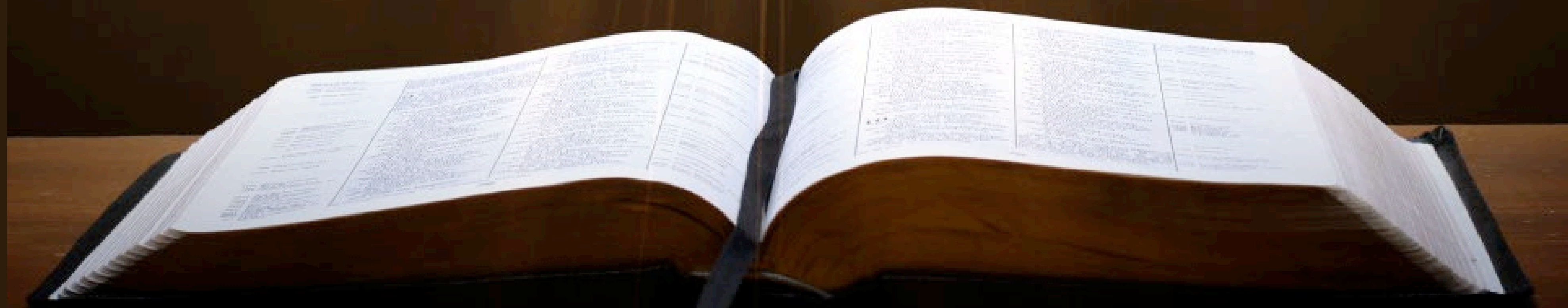

About**

Crowns and Rewards



- 1. *Stephanos*—the victor's crown: a crown given as an award for successful achievement, for victory in the Olympic games, bravery in combat, or a place of honor at a feast. The *stephanos* is given for achievement or merit. This is the term used to describe the crown of thorns on Jesus' head.**

2. *Diadema*—the royal crown: describes a crown used for a king. DIADEMA is not used for the believer's rewards in the Bible.

Mark 15:17, “And they clothed Him with purple; and they twisted a crown of thorns, put it on His head;”

- 3. The Romans had many different crowns as decorations in the military; they also gave crowns to the winners of athletic contests.**
 - a. The *corona obsidionalis* or *graminia*—a wreath woven from grass on the spot—was given to a general who broke a siege.**
 - b. The *corona myrtea* or *ovalis*, the crown of bay leaves, was given to the general who had a lesser triumph.**
 - c. The *corona civica* was a crown made of golden oak leaves. This was awarded to a soldier who saved the life of another.**

- d. The *corona navalis* was the highest decoration in the navy for destroying an enemy fleet or the first marine to board an enemy ship.**
- e. The *corona vallaris* made of gold, was awarded to the first soldier to reach the enemy lines in battle.**

4. Each crown included monetary reward, freedom from taxes, children educated at public expense, and a statue of the person erected in the public square. The crown is used by analogy for the greatest honors God can give to believers.

5. To understand the nature of crowns we must understand the cultural imagery of the games which underlies this metaphor. The believer is compared to the athlete.

2 Tim. 2:4, “No soldier in active service entangles himself in the affairs of everyday life, so that he may please the one who enlisted him as a soldier.

2 Tim. 2:5, “And also if anyone competes as an athlete, he does not win the prize unless he competes according to the rules.”

6. The games were well known in the ancient world and developed in Greece during the 6th century B.C.

Rev. 4:6, “Before the throne there was a sea of glass, like crystal. And in the midst of the throne, and around the throne, were four living creatures full of eyes in front and in back.”

1 Tim. 4:8, “For bodily exercise profits a little, but godliness is profitable for all things, having promise of the life that now is and of that which is to come.”

2 Tim. 4:6, “For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure has come.

2 Tim. 4:7, “I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith;”

2 Tim. 4:8, “in the future there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day; and not only to me, but also to all who have loved His appearing.”

Rev. 2:10, “Do not fear any of those things which you are about to suffer. Indeed, the devil is about to throw *some* of you into prison, that you may be tested, and you will have tribulation ten days. Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life.”

James 1:12, “Blessed *is* the man who endures temptation; for when he has been approved [*dokimos*], he will receive the crown of life which the Lord has promised to those who love Him.”
